GLOBAL GRANTS

Global Grant Scholars are a great way that the Foundation offers support for creating change to the world.

Recently Andrew Nguyen has commenced his studies at The London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. He is studying for his Masters of Science Tropical Medicine and International Health. He was associate lecturer at University of Queensland in infectious diseases.

Last year Julie Hennigan went to Oxford University to do a PhD in Social Intervention. Julie has already submitted four papers during her PhD and two of these have already been assessed as excellent work. She has undertaken at her own expense and initiative, done additional courses to further her analytical research skills. Her dedication has seen her elected as a student representation at her college and has organised numerous events to help other students to embrace University and College life in Oxford.

At a Rotary level, Julie has presented at a number of Rotary Clubs and organised a team of Rotary Scholars to take part in the North Oxford Rotary Club's Rowathon to raise money for local charities. Julie has also extended her charity work to act as a free consultant for 3 other charities.

DISTRICT GRANTS

- 1) The Centenary High School & Indooroopilly High Schools provide a Chaplin Service which provides a breakfast meeting program. This program is an inclusive breakfast for both at risk and other students who also support the program. Staff from the school also assist in the program. \$4,000 being an even split from District Funds & Rotary Club of Toowong were provided to these programs. The schools have participants in this program of 150 & 200 students each.
 - Club members also support the project with their work at the school in the project.
- 2) The Maleny Men's Shed was supported by the Maleny Club. This was the supply of concrete slab on which erected a "Men's Shed" to house their equipment and provide an area to conduct their activities. This was a total cost of \$10,500 with a District Grant of \$4,250.
- The Rotary Club of BULOLO WAU used \$6,600 with a grant of \$3,300 for the defibrillators deployment for community use. This was the purchase of three defibrillators to be located in areas frequently by large numbers of the community, especially those at risk due to age and/or type of activity (namely the town's main shopping centre, the RSL club and the football club located in a large complex). Ongoing maintenance costs to be borne by the organisations at the locations.

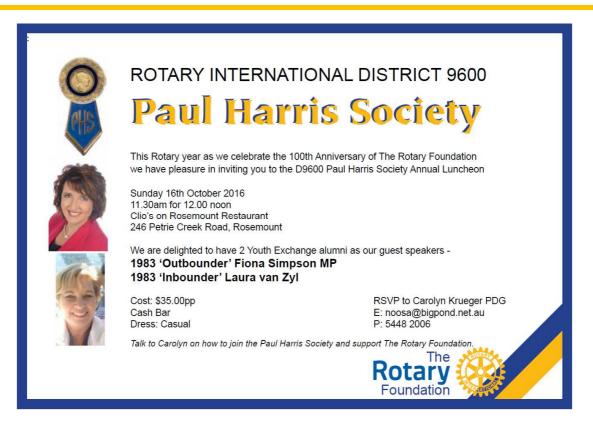

OVERCOMING MALNUTRITION IN PAPUA NEW GUINEA - Russ Stephenson, George and Mary Grant

Malnutrition remains one of the greatest challenges in the world today. Half of all deaths of children less than 5 years old are due, either directly or indirectly, to malnutrition, a total of 3 million deaths each year.

In PNG, most children are critically malnourished. This Global Grant proposal focuses on the nutrition of pregnant and lactating women, babies and children up to 5 years, the period when 90% of brain development occurs. Any setback at this critical stage does irreparable damage.

All the necessary foods required already grow in village gardens. The project will encourage village women to improve their own diet so they produce healthy babies, and an adequate supply of good quality breast milk to feed them. They will be encouraged to adopt a varied diet of 'superfoods' in sufficient quantities to supply adequate essential nutrients for unrestricted growth and development of their children.

The key will be to assist village women in understanding the link between the nutritive content of food and good health and unrestricted development in children – how supplying the right nutrients overcomes nutritional disorders, including the less

obvious, but devastating impairment of infant growth and development.

The project will encourage consumption of complimentary food rich in energy, particularly from vegetable oils, and protein, to supplement existing diets. If you would like to learn more, I would be happy to speak about this project at your Rotary Club.

Teacher in a Box provides an interactive interface to the more than 10,000 videos and tutorials of Khan Academy, a quality online learning resource that is currently being used in classrooms and homes throughout the world.
