GLOBAL GRANTS

The Paul Dunn Memorial Dental Project Global Grant is a conjunction between the Jiwaka Province Local Government and the Rotary Club of Nondugal PNG to establish a sustainable dental clinic to service the local and surrounding areas. It spans 8 districts across the Jiwaka Province for 200,000 people including 40,000 children.

The project provided the equipment, training of staff support and education for the local staff to be able to operate a sustainable dental clinic. It included numerous visits by Australian dentists to provide on the job training and education as well as the organisation of a local dentist to visit Australia for continual ongoing training.

This Grant was a joint project between The Rotary Clubs of Nondugal and Green Hills – Maitland. The project has a total value of \$US 128, 028 of \$US 5,000 from DDF (District Designated Funds) and \$US 63,642 from the World Fund. 8 districts contributed to the project.

DISTRICT GRANTS

1) The Rotary Club of Brisbane High-Rise have used \$5,000 of District Grant and \$5,000 of Club money to go to Mamba Primary School Project. The Mamba Primary School is located on the slopes of Mount Kilimanjaro in Tanzania. The Rotary Foundation project has been undertaken with the cooperation of the local Rotary Club Mkuu Rombo which has controlled the process from start to finish. High-Rise involvement has been maintained by visits (4) by Club members including a group of 19 in January 2015.

Like many government - owned schools in Tanzania there is no electricity provided to the school. This project will connect the school to the national electricity grid and covers the electrical wiring of the school as well.

The provision of electricity will benefit the school in many ways; most immediate will be the capacity for light in the classroom and other school building; particularly during Winter these buildings can be very dark for long periods of the day. This is not conducive to the provision of a productive learning environment.

The other major benefit will be that with electricity the school can look towards providing access to computers for all students. Computers access will open up the learning opportunities and experiences for all children.

The Rotary Club of Kingaroy has done a project worth \$2,500 with a District Grant of \$1,250 for the Refurbishment of club barbecue trailer.

They purchased and installed a refrigeration plant in the trailer so it meets health requirements for our weekly sausage sizzles which provide a regular income which is then applied to TRF donations.

Rotary Peace Fellow Catrina was born in Toronto, Ontario. Growing up in a multiethnic household with immigrant parents, her mother being from Trinidad and Tobago and her father from Germany, Catrina was instilled with a strong appreciation for multiculturalism and an understanding of the challenges associated with cultural coalescence. This understanding has inspired her passion to work towards the empowerment of women and building healthy, resilient communities. Catrina's international work has taken her to Latin America, Africa and Central Asia for projects helping to strengthen and integrate healthcare systems.

For the past three years, she has worked as a consultant on a maternal, newborn and child health project partnership between the Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development and local institutions both in Canada and Kenya.

The ultimate goal of this project has been the reduction

of maternal and infant mortality in rural regions of Kenya. As a Community Development Specialist, she has helped to create strategies that increase women's access to primary healthcare as well as develop self-sustaining communities. In addition to her time in Kenya, she worked as a Program Manager with a grassroots HIV/AIDS NGO in Southwestern Ontario addressing the AIDS pandemic in Lesotho, Africa. Her involvement with Rotary began in 2010 with a six-month Canadian International Development Agency internship in Guayaquil Ecuador where Catrina worked as a Health Education Assistant. Her local Rotary club has been an inspirational force throughout her career in international service and development. She feels incredibly blessed with the opportunity to be a Rotary Peace Fellow.

END POLIO NOW!

For over 30 years Rotarians have been on a mission to eradicate Polio from the face of the earth. Now that there are only two endemic countries left, we have to ensure that we meet our goal. Rotary has taken the lead in this endeavour and as Bell Gates said, if it was not for Rotary's leadership in this cause, we could not have achieved what we have.

The leadership and vision that this major undertaking could be achieved was taken by an Australian Past President of Rotary International Sir Clem Renouf, in his Presidential year of 1978-79. While Polio Plus is credited to have begun in 1985, it was the vision and leadership of Sir Clem that got that program started.

This year we need to keep the contributions strong to ensure that the vaccination program keeps going and that globally we can be safe from this virus. Five years after the last case is reported is how long the vaccination program needs to keep running to ensure that it does not resurface.

Looking ahead, please ensure that your club has a goal in place to support the end game and make a contribution this year. If EVERY club made a contribution of US\$1,500, the impact would be enormous. We ask that every Club is encouraged to ensure that at least one meeting this year is dedicated to the End Polio Now program and that a Special contribution is made.



ARTICLE FROM THE ABC: Humanity's journey to wipe out polio has been a long and incredible one, Erica Vowles

Pakistan and Afghanistan are the only countries today where the wild polio virus remains endemic. But 100 years ago, the disease could strike anywhere. The first major epidemic was in 1916, on the east coast of America, centred on New York.

'That's really when people first appreciated that polio was a huge threat, and also that medical science couldn't do anything about it,' says Gareth Williams, an emeritus professor at the University of Bristol and the author of *Paralysed with Fear: The Story of Polio*.

As soon as we take our eye off the ball and cases build up again, suddenly we've got polio all over the world again.

'About 25,000 people were paralysed in and around New York, and 6,000 of those died.'

Prior to the 20th century, Williams says, poor sanitation meant people encountered the polio virus as a baby, while their mother's breast milk still gave them some immunity.

Improved sanitation at the end of the 19th century saw people being exposed to polio much later in life, with disastrous

consequences. Polio is commonly spread by what is called the faecal-oral route, which means a person contracts the virus after coming into contact with intestinal viruses from another individual infected with polio.

One in 100 people who catch the polio virus then develop paralysis.

Developing a vaccination

The US, Australia, Europe and elsewhere were hit by waves of polio epidemics up until the 1960s.
